This year's theme, Carnivale, will transport you to a night in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil with bright colors and high energy.


Being held for the first time ever in the Colonnades Club in Memorial Stadium on May 5th, this prom will be one to remember.

The Magic of Mississippi Habitat for Humanity's fifth trip

2018 marks the five-year anniversary of the Habitat for Humanity trip to Tutwiler Mississippi, led by co-sponsors Mark Foley and Laura Koritz, and handful of students were lucky enough to be selected for a very special trip.

Being one of the lucky few, I was blessed with the opportunity to go to a 14 hour drive down south to Tutwiler, Mississippi, one of the poorest communities in the state. The Delta region in Mississippi has deep history and is known for devastating floods, the murder of Emmett Till, and more positively, the birthplace of the Blues.

Five years ago, Koritz and Foley came up with the idea to travel down to Mississippi because they had both done previous Habitat work there and wanted to bring that experience to high school students. They received approval at the time from interim principal Joe Wiemelt, but with the subsequent hiring of Matthew Stark in a permanent position, they had to seek approval all over again.

And that is when the magic happened.

Melina Pakey-Rodriguez agrees that the experience was magical. Going for two years in a row she had a personal connection with the trip. Other veterans, Claire Lambeth, Eliseo Gonzalez-Kamekawa, Rodrigo Orrala, and Eleanor DAndria also have a special connection.

"The Magic of Mississippi is what I think is the best part of the trip," Rodriguez states. "School makes you worry so much about yourself and overanalyze everything. The trip helped me declutter my mind. I focused on using my hands. I focused on opening my heart to connect to people. It was all about helping and loving."

Lambeth primarily worked with the construction of the house and came to view it as more than just a shelter. "To just build at Mississippi, it's so different from building here. It felt like my child that I put so much hard work and dedication working and making."

Eleanor DAndria was impacted powerfully by the trip, as well. Other than just the house build, we also had the opportunity to volunteer our time to Bearden Elementary School. DAndria worked with a second grade class led by Ora Johnson whom DAndria describes as "...a powerful woman. Especially thinking of my elementary school,

Johnson reminded me of my fourth grade teacher. She really cares about her students."

DAndria was inspired by the love Johnson had for her students. Coming back to Urbana, she has decided to spearhead a drive to collect backpacks and school supplies to send back to the students at Bearden.

In general Mississippi made DAndria feel as though she can change something. "The trip made me pursue things I care about; we did something to mean something. High school makes you so caught up on what other people think of us; whether you're smarter than the person next to you. But going to the trip made me realize that other things are more important. Typically I would tell myself I don't have time for these kinds of projects but now I have to make time for this."

Next year, junior Alexandra Hentges will be the only returner on the trip, as everyone else is graduating this year. Hentges put upon herself the responsibility of trying to experience everything at the trip this year in order to be able to explain to next year's newcomers what to expect. "Being in Mississippi without even knowing the environment, you can get emotionally invested," Hentges states. "Just waking up you're motivated to work. It's so exciting you can do it with people you didn't know much before but then you're growing closer with everyday."

Not only did the students get impacted drastically, the supervisors were emotionally invested.

Erin Harrington, another supervisor on the trip, places value in Urbana's deep connections to the South.

"My brother, when he was in high school, also had a Habitat club who brought them to Massachusetts during spring break. Urbana was different than my brother's experience because with him and his club, they just dumped themselves in an new environment, but we learned about Mississippi before coming down. Urbana has connections to the Delta. Urbana is on this line between Chicago; which then connects to Mississippi."

"There are students here that I've talked to who say their families were from Mississippi who used to be sharecroppers. Because of this I hope students like that choose one day to go on the Mississippi trip to broaden the connection; it's really meaningful. Because it's not charity; it's more like retribution."

If you're interested for next year, ask any of the Habitat people who went to the trip and they will be glad to share their unique experiences.

Foley states what he saw primarily unique about the trip this year, "open hearts have a better experience."

It's easy, it's cheesy, it's mac-y. What is it? You guessed it, it's the mac-n-cheese shapes review everyone has *definitely* been anticipating.

It's believed that with the various kinds of Kraft Easy Mac, the shapes somehow all taste differently. We spent our entire fourth period class eating Easy Mac shapes in the faculty lounge to see for ourselves.

Our experiment consisted of three different Easy Mac shapes: Minions (ugly banana sellouts), Trolls (that one movie that has nothing but song covers), and Star Wars (space fighting. pew pew).

Here's what we found:

Star Wars:



It was really hot and burned our mouths. We probably should've waited a bit after it came out of the microwave, but we're salty so we are just going to blame Kraft for our tongue injuries (thinking of starting a GoFund-Me to sue).

Overall rating: 7/10
