

## La Casa Cultura Latina

A welcoming space for Latinx students

La Casa Cultura Latina may seem like just a brightly colored home on the University of Illinois Campus, but in reality it is much more: a cultural resource center for Latinx students at the University of Illinois.

La Casa has deep significance for the Latinx community at UIUC, as it serves to provide support for equality and safety. By welcoming all majors and talents, Latinx students at UIUC know they have a positive space for development of character and education.

The rich history behind La Casa was first established when Latinx students felt the obvious split between Latinx students and the white students within the university.

"La Casa started because Latino students knew that the U of I was a primarily white institution so the students were already feeling like a minority and knew they needed more resources to be able to graduate, so students asked for the space to come in existence," says Jorge Menas, Assistant Director of La Casa.

What makes La Casa so special to students is that the resource center was something Latinx students fought for. After the opening of the African American Cultural Center, Latinx students marched on campus to gain support for their own resource center.

La Casa is a testament to the

hard work of Latinx students, who fought to not only create, but later to improve, their space. After protests over under-funding and under-development, the old La Casa was demolished to make way for a better space.

The current house has been up since 1992, with professional staff to guide students through their studies. The three directors there were hired due to demand by the students for the support from a member of society like themselves.

"The reason my job is here to help Latinx students is because they asked for that job to exist," says Menas.

Though in a new building, one element of the previous one still remains: murals originally created as an "illegal" act that speak powerfully for the Latinx community. These murals were preserved as a travelling art installation around the country

while the current artwork in La Casa were ordered specifically to be painted for the resource center.

Today, La Casa provides workshops for students, such as the Mentoring Encouraging Teaching Achieving initiative, or META for short. META is about helping students interact with the world, with a broad range of topics from sexual health to workforce salaries. Two other weekly events open to the community are the Latino Resilience Network and Lunch on Us, a discussion series that brings the community together over food.

Though the programs offered vary, there is one key element: Latinx students coming together as a culture and as a minority, much as they did in the 1970s and 1990s, to work together as a community.

Do not take that frog!



A driver's' ed instructor and teacher at Urbana High School for more than three decades, Randy Blackman will perhaps best be remembered for his work on the sidelines as the sixth-winningest soccer coach in IHSA history. His soccer teams have won more than 400 games and the soccer field at UHS is named in his honor, putting him in rare air among local high school coaches.

After starting his career with a 7-8 record in 1986, Blackman and the Tigers only failed to win ten games in a season three times over the next 19 years, which included a trip to the state tournament in 1991. The Tigers additional trips to state in 2005 and 2012, both of which came following 20-win campaigns.

But in the world of high school coaching, longevity isn't measured by wins and losses. Rather, character is what sets legends like Blackman apart from the rest of the pack. Former player Sam Arend explains what Blackman has meant to him:

"Coach Blackman is the best coach I've ever had. He's the type of coach that encourages you to get better and doesn't just tell you what to do," says Arend.

"It's very clear under his guidance when you get better at what you're doing and when you can use it in a game. With his style I know how to play in a game, how to be the best I can be at my position and most importantly how to win."

UHS Athletic Director Steve Waller has worked closely with Blackman since even before assuming his role as AD, and he has nothing but glowing remarks for the man who helped build Urbana into one of the great powerhouses in IHSA soccer.

"Coach Blackman has been a tremendous asset to the Urbana HS Athletic Department, particularly to the wrestling and soccer programs, over his 30-plus year tenure. He has brought great passion and commitment to bringing his programs to conference and state recognition. Not only has made a huge impact in athletics, he has also been a staple of success in the classroom and community. I wish him all the best with his next chapter in life."

Erin Ludwick, Assistant Principal of Discipline and Attendance at Urbana High School will be leaving Urbana at the end of the school year as she takes an Assistant Principal job at Downers Grove North High School in Downers Grove, Illinois.

Ludwick has worked at Urbana High School for 11 years, teaching Journalism and English before being promoted to a dean and later assistant principal.

"I have been so fortunate to have a strong staff who have helped me grow as leader and an administrator. I feel like UHS takes care of each other, and I will miss my relationships here," said Ludwick.
